2024-25 Advanced Placement U.S. History (Grade 11) Summer Reading and Assignments

Course Description:

Students will explore, analyze, and interpret the nine periods of American history from precontact through the present. Particular emphasis will be placed on learning how to succeed on the AP exam by learning how to effectively complete multiple-choice questions (MCQ), respond to short answer questions (SAQ), craft an argument for long essay questions (LEQ), and analyze documents for a document-based question (DBQ). Students will be required to obtain the appropriate AP US History textbook determined by the instructor during the summer before entering the course. This college-level course meets graduation requirements for the state of North Carolina but also provides the opportunity to earn college credit if proficiency is demonstrated on the Advance Placement Exam. Students are required to take the AP exam in May. An exam fee is required.

Your Summer Introduction, Textbook, and Documents:

You will no doubt remember from our interest meeting that you have many assignments to complete over the summer. Based on the overwhelming nature of how much material we will need to cover this year, you must begin your study of American history <u>well before school</u> <u>begins in August</u>.

- You will need to purchase the *American Pageant* textbook (either the digital version OR the actual textbook). I have the 11th edition currently, but feel free to purchase ANY edition 10th OR newer (more recent).
- The College Board has decided that American history should be divided into nine time periods. It will be your task to read and begin the *first two time periods* before we meet in school in August. These two time periods will represent approximately 8-10% of the total AP Exam next May.
- Chapters 1-6 in the *American Pageant* correspond and represent APUSH Time Periods 1 & 2. So, you will need to read the corresponding chapters and complete the worksheet questions for each chapter. <u>Answer ALL the questions fully and completely</u>... and for any people/terms/items listed, you should define them fully and understand the historical context that they exist in.
- Though it is NOT required, I would also encourage each of you buy a test prep book from Princeton Review. Please get the 2022 edition. It is cheaper and there is no difference between that one and this year's, other than the price. This will help with studying content and the exam format. We will need it during the year too. *Princeton Review AP U.S. History Prep, 2022* (College Test Preparation) by The Princeton Review (Paperback). ISBN 9780525571056.

Within the first two weeks of the new school year, during a Social Studies test day, you will be given a test on the first <u>SIX CHAPTERS</u> that you completed over the summer. This test will be multiple choice and should be easily completed if you did the reading and the chapter assignments. All of the information on that introductory test will come straight from the first six chapters and/or the worksheets. This test will help you and I determine if AP is the right course fit for you. Again, please remember that APUSH is not a required course, nor is it open to everybody... nor is it "right" for everybody. It is a rigorous, college level, demanding, reading and writing intensive course, requiring a commitment to study, work, and test weekly.

Summer Assignments: All due the first day of class in August!

Assignment 1: Write an introduction of yourself using the following format: Five paragraphs that include an introduction, three body paragraphs, and a conclusion. This should be handwritten in <u>BLUE or BLACK pen</u>. All assignments should be completed in pen this year... as is the case with your AP written exam... meaning it is time to practice writing in pen now! In this introduction you will tell me who you are, interesting things about yourself that I should know, why you are taking this class (honestly)... as well as your favorite issue to study in American history, and anything else that you think is relevant for me to know (are you a history nerd like me, do you play sports, why you are at Bishop, future college and career plans... these are just ideas to work off of but the introduction is largely open in nature for you to tell me anything I should know about you).

Assignment 2: Read Chapter 1 New World Beginnings and complete questions on worksheet.

Assignment 3: Read Chapter 2 Planting of English America and complete questions on worksheet.

Assignment 4: Read Chapter 3 The Northern Colonies and complete questions on worksheet.

Assignment 5: Read Chapter 4 Seventeenth Century American Life and complete questions on worksheet.

Assignment 6: Read Chapter 5 Eighteenth Century Colonial Society and complete questions/terms on worksheet.

Assignment 7: Read Chapter 6 The Duel for North America and complete questions/terms on worksheet.

Assignment 8: Use your newly purchased test prep book or online resources to familiarize yourself with the AP multiple choice style. This style is different from how you have been trained your whole life. The AP style usually includes a stimulus (photograph, document, map...) and three-to-four questions associated with that stimulus. Your first test in this class (and most tests) will be in this format. If you fail the first test that will cover chapters 1-6, I will strongly recommend that you be removed from APUSH and placed into an honors or CP U.S. history course.

Assignment 9: This assignment is RECOMMENDED but NOT REQUIRED. Begin watching the YouTube Crash Course series on American history with John Green. You should watch episodes 1 - 6 linked here:

Assignment 10: Write a summary in an essay format, detailing what you have learned thus far from your reading. How have we gotten to THIS point in American history (pre-colonial America)? What is going on in America at this time? What does the future look like based on what you've read thus far? And how are British/American relations at this moment in time? This paper should be 2-4 pages long... again, handwritten in blue OR black ink pen.

Notes about summer assignments -

- *Everything should be completed in blue or black pen*. If it is not, you will be asked to redo it properly with a late penalty. You will not need a pencil for this class.
- You may complete these assignments at your own pace. However, you should note that if you choose to wait until the weekend before the new year begins, you will cause yourself a great deal of trouble and may not produce high quality work... which may result in your removal from the course.
- APUSH requires a LOT of reading... IF you are not up to this task or think that you will not be able to keep up with the reading assignments, then you need to consider being moved to an honors or CP US History course instead.
- These TEN summer assignments will let me know your level of preparation and dedication to this course. AND they are required to KEEP UP with the course framework as dictated by the AP College Board. If your summer work is sub-par, late, or missing, I will recommend that you be placed in an honors or CP course instead of APUSH.
- IF you can keep up with the reading... AND if you can get these summer assignments completed and turned in... then you will have prepared yourself for a fantastic year in a great course and subject!

Notes about next year -

- ChatGPT ... our brave new world is throwing some new wrinkles our way. AI technology is the latest thing. Please think about this as we move forward. As tempting as it may sound to throw a topic into this AI machine and have it churn out a finely tuned, perfectly crafted research paper... please understand that using this technology in this way only sabotages your learning, lessens your ability to grasp and understand the subject matter, and will assure your inability to pass the AP Exam next May. I am sure that this technology is beneficial in many capacities... but not in this class.
- We will write and submit most papers in pen. There will be a few exceptions to that rule, however. ALL typed-written papers will be submitted through "Turnitin.com". This app has been purchased by Bishop McGuinness High School and has been thoroughly vetted and tested. It has been shown to be 98% effective in identifying AI generated material. Additionally, it also can identify and weed out plagiarism and copyrighted material. It is a very effective tool for teachers.
- I am telling you this NOW so that there is no mistaking or misunderstanding your responsibility for doing your OWN WORK. IF you submit any work that is flagged by Turnitin.com as being AI generated, *only that portion that is considered original to you will be graded*. You will not be offered a second chance to resubmit an original writing. Please be smart.

Chapters 1-6 Focus Questions: (*These questions may be answered ON this document OR on notebook paper – it is completely up to you!*)

<u>Chapter 1:</u>

- 1. What was Native American society like before European contact? What similarities and differences existed between different groups of people?
- 2. What factors led to Europe's increased exploration and to the discovery of the NewWorld?
- 3. What is the Columbian Exchange? What are some of the results of the Columbian Exchange?
- 4. What was the role of conquistadores and encomienda in establishing a Spanish Empire in the New World?
- 5. What was the geographic extent of the Spanish Empire in the New World? What nations were challenging Spain's dominance in the New World and where?
